

Easter Lilies & Hydrangea

Choose the Right Plant:

When choosing your Easter lily, don't fall victim to the immediate self-gratification of open flowers. Admire the plant with every flower open and trumpeting out to you, but buy the one with the majority of buds still closed and eager to pop and give you weeks of their shimmering white blooms.

Remove Pollen:

In the Victorian era they removed the yellow anthers because the exposed "organs" gave people impure thoughts. We recommend removing them, but for a different reason; it makes the flowers last longer and you won't have to worry about a yellow nose when you smell them.

Place in a Cool Spot:

The flowers will last longer in a cool spot, so keep it away from bright, sunny windows. Watch out for dry or cold drafts (like a heating vent or oft-opening door), which will shorten its life-span.

Water Soil When Dry to the Touch:

It will only need water when the soil dries to the touch, and shouldn't need to be fertilized unless you're planting them outside in spring. If you bought it in a foil wrapper, make sure to either remove the wrapper, poke holes in it, or be vigilant about draining it lest your lily drown in its own wet feet.

Overwintering:

Depending on who you ask, you'll hear that Easter Lilies are hardy anywhere from zone 5-8. The exact zone doesn't matter much here in zone 3, although I have heard anecdotal tales about people overwintering them in areas that are close to the house and very sheltered.
